- 4. HOV High occupancy-vehicle facility; a minimum of 2+ occupants are required but may be higher on a few facilities. (Operator determinant.) Single-occupant vehicles (SOVs) that are qualified "low emission and energy-efficient vehicles" and identified by license plate or tag may also be permitted on this facility by the authority, but only until September 30, 2025, citation: 23 United States Code Title 23 Section 166(b)(5).
- 5. BOS bus on shoulder; an improved shoulder that permits bus use typically only during peak congestion periods.
- 6. HOT high occupancy toll facility; effectively a HOV lane (HOVs are free) but is open during specified hours to toll paying SOVs.
- 7. ETL Express toll lane facility; all vehicles choosing to use this pay a toll. HOVs may be free at operator discretion.
- 8. SPTSU Static part-time shoulder use; allows vehicles to use the improved (i.e., weight bearing) shoulder during preestablished schedules.
- 9. DPTSU Dynamic part-time shoulder use; allows vehicles to use the improved shoulder as indicated by operator permission, i.e., "when open."
- 10. BL A dedicated bus lane or combined busway and transitway; typically, a lane dedicated only for use by buses and qualifying transit operators, i.e., not a shoulder as in "BOS."
- 11. TL A dedicated truck lane; not a common "passing lane" on a highway.
- 12. NTEL Non-toll express lane; a specialty lane that is not priced (not tolled) but is intended to enable longer distance travel that bypasses intermediate confluence at midpoint exits.
- 13. TOLL Toll road, aka, turnpike; a pay-to-use facility, e.g., the Pennsylvania Turnpike, the Ohio Turnpike, or Florida's Turnpike System of roads. Some of these are on the Federal interstate system but many are not.


